The group matches in the qualification stage contributed 71% of the total matches played.

There were 64 individual matches with a 12-10 or higher score in the 5th game. The **longest game** was in the Championship Division women's event between Austria's **Sofia Polcanova** and Hungary's **Dora Madrasz**, **Polcanova** won 11-8, 8-11, 8-11, 11-6, **21-19** in the 114 point match. However the **longest match** had even more points than this. On day 1 of the championships Hungary's **Bence Majoros** beat Serbia's **Zsolt Peto** 7-11, 13-11, 11-5, 15-17, 15-13 (**118 pts**). Hungary went on to win the men's 2nd Division, and the majority of their team matches were decided in 5 matches.

It is technically possible for a player to win 18 matches at the team championships, if the team reaches the final and a player is required to play twice in every match. This was not achieved by any player, however Lithuanian player **Tomas Mikutis** played 16 matches, winning 11 of them, the LTU team won the 3rd Division men's title and will join 2nd Division in 2020 at the WTTC in Busan, Korea. **Bence Majoros** from Hungary won 12 matches and lost just 4, but the most wins achieved in Halmstad was **Hu Melek** from Turkey, with 14 wins, 2 losses. The Turkish team were runner up in the women's 2nd Division and will move up to the Championship Division in 2020.

China won a record 21st team title in both men's and women's events.

Sweden stood on the men's podium with bronze medals for the first time since 2004.
